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Dear Families,

The spell of hot weather I predicted in last week's newsletter has most certainly arrived and has now officially become a heatwave, with the first ever Red Warning issued in the UK by the Met Office for high temperatures. This week has been very warm; the start of next week is forecast to be incredibly hot. Temperatures are predicted to reach 35°C or 36°C in the afternoon, with a more likely 'feels like' temperature of 37°C or 38°C. It will be hotter than the peak temperature (35.9°C) of the long hot summer of 1976 and there is the distinct possibility that the highest-ever temperature recorded in the UK of 38.7°C



(Cambridge Botanical Garden, 25th July 2019) will be obliterated in several parts of the country. We are preparing for significant heat. It is our intention to remain fully open, but as you are already aware, so that the health, safety and wellbeing of the children and our staff is prioritised, we may yet be required to enact a partial or full closure of the school.

In order to try to keep the school community as safe as possible, and following consultation with some other local schools, as well as following local and national guidance, we are making adaptations to our arrangements, some of which you have already been informed about.

What we will do:

- Children can attend these days wearing either their school uniform **or** school P.E. kit, whichever is preferable.
- Children in Years R to Year 4 have been asked to bring a complete spare set of cool, light and loose clothing to school on both days as we may provide cooling opportunities for the children using sprinklers and hose pipes. This will not be a time for fun play in the water but will be a chance for children to cool down in the heat of the day. Remaining in damp clothes will help the children to stay cool but if they become uncomfortable, they will have the chance to change in to something fresh.
- Children will be encouraged to drink plenty of water and refill their bottles frequently.
- Outside activities will be carried out in shaded areas, and the hottest parts of the day will be avoided.
- ***IMPORTANT*** We recognise that different children cope with heat in different ways, and you know your children best, so if you feel your child will struggle in school in the afternoon heat, we are offering an optional pick-up time of 12:30 p.m. (YR Y2) and 1 p.m. (Y3 & Y4) on both Monday and Tuesday. If your child is in Y5 or Y6, they will be rehearsing for their performances of Cinderella & Rockerfella (Monday) or actually performing it (Tuesday) at the Watson Hall in the afternoons (see below information). If you would like your Y5 or Y6 child to leave early on Monday or Tuesday, they will need to be collected from the Watson Hall a tricky decision I know as leaving will of course impact the play.

What you can do:

- It is essential that children bring a water bottle into school so they can keep hydrated in the high temperatures. We have also asked, where possible, that the children bring a second named bottle containing frozen water.
- Please ensure your child has a sun hat or cap and comes to school with suncream applied to all exposed skin.
- Collect your child at 12:30 p.m. (YR Y2) or 1 p.m. (Y3 Y6) if you feel they would be adversely affected by the afternoon heat. Please indicate your intention to do so by completing this short online form: <u>https://forms.office.com/r/qKB5Py1amy</u>

Y5 & Y6 Performances of Cinderella & Rockerfella:

On Monday, we are still planning to go ahead with our Cinderella & Rockerfella rehearsals for children in Y5 and Y6. The Watson Hall is a large and airy building with many places to take respite from the sun. Please send your child with plenty to eat and drink for the duration of the day. Your support with dropping and collecting the children from the venue on Monday makes this possible and is <u>very</u> <u>much appreciated</u>. On Tuesday, we wish to go ahead with the afternoon and evening performances. At present, we are looking into contingency transport plans for the afternoon so that children do not need to be out walking in the midday sun. **Our Year 3 and Year 4 children may not be able to attend the perfomance as planned - we will keep everyone updated on this**. We would also value your



continued support to enable the evening performance to go ahead on Tuesday. Whilst we cannot guarantee anything at this stage, we will do everything we can to ensure that our end of year plans for Y6 are undisrupted. However, as always, everyone's health and safety must come first.

Thank you for your continued support and please stay safe in the heat!

School Dinners

Please try to book school meals, Breakfast Club spaces and Tirlebrookers After-School Club slots for the first week back at school *before returning in September*. It is so easy to forget to do this over the summer holidays and this often causes issues at the beginning of the new academic year. We would be really grateful if you could book things up in advance to help ease the pressure on our catering team and office staff. Please be aware that until the year groups 'roll up' on our SCOPAY system,

your child will still be showing in their current year group. However, this does not affect the booking process and booking ahead really does help us. Please remember that school dinners continue to be free for infants. However, meal choices still need to be made in advance. Importantly, if your child is currently in Y2, school meals must be paid for when


Music Lessons

Y5 & Y6 Visit to the Tewkesbury Medieval Festival - Friday 8th July Mrs. Featonby writes,



'Tirlebrook were excited to return to the battlefields at this year's Tewkesbury Medieval Festival to relive the brutal battle of Tewkesbury and witness first-hand the rivalry between Queen Margaret and King Edward. Our day began with a special greeting from the live actors, who kindly yelled at us to get in line, screamed at the teachers for not organising their squire and then sent us on our way, ready to begin an eventful day of squire training, archery, dancing, drumming and singing.

Archery was an enjoyable experience, during which the children were shown how to use a bow and arrow (thankfully, not a spiked one!) After an informative presentation of weaponry from one of the archers, we took part in an exciting (and slightly vengeful!) challenge. The children were shown how to use shields and spears correctly, before being attacked ... by the teachers! Don't worry - we used foam arrows and small, plastic balls. A quick drink in a lovely shaded area, took place before we awoke our musical spirits; the children engaged in drumming, singing and dancing workshops, combining all 3 together to create an authentic performance as a group. The first activity was swinging a sword at a wooden post - being taught to strike the legs, arms and then head!
